

Our Church School Statement: Mission, Vision and Values

We, the Governing Body of St. Bartholomew's C of E Primary School, continuing the long heritage of our church school, endorse the following mission statement, vision, core values and aim as the basis for putting our Christian ethos into practice, for the good of our pupils, their families and our community.

Mission Statement

All those working for and with St. Bartholomew's C of E Primary School aim to offer one of the richest, most engaging experiences for our pupils' formative years, developing moral character whilst achieving academic excellence, underpinned by clear Christian values.

Every child will be given the opportunity to develop into a mature, confident and considerate person within a safe, disciplined and stimulating environment. They will be encouraged to be critical thinkers, citizens who pursue truth, are respectful of others and tolerant of difference, ready to live peaceful, law-abiding lives, full of purpose, in a free and democratic society.

Vision

We uphold that all people, created in God's image, are of equal value and worth and therefore must be treated with respect and given the greatest opportunity to flourish as human beings in God's world. We should all therefore aim to reflect His character as best we can.

Core Values

Based on a clear Christian understanding of the world in which we live, we uphold: truth, forgiveness, compassion, thankfulness, humility, determination, excellence and service.

Each of these virtues runs throughout our curriculum and the whole of school life. These are just some of the virtues we see in Jesus, as recorded in the Bible. He is our role model, the perfect example of how people should be.

Based on these values, we aim to provide outstanding education which encourages all of our pupils to achieve their personal best, make wise decisions, appreciate the wonder of all of creation and look to the needs of others, wherever they may be.

Aim

Our aim is to provide outstanding education, underpinned by distinctively Christian values, developing our pupils academically, morally and spiritually, within and as part of the wider community.

Our children's rewording of our values

- TRUTH: "Be honest, always telling the truth and being open about our mistakes and achievements."
- FORGIVENESS: "Be ready to forgive each other quickly."
- COMPASSION: "Be kind and caring to others, being friendly and not letting people feel judged, lonely or left out."
- THANKFULNESS: "Take pride in all we do, being thankful to God for all we have."
- HUMILITY: "Be polite and respectful, having good manners and understanding the views and feelings of others."
- DETERMINATION: "Always keep going, even when things are difficult."
- EXCELLENCE: "Work hard and enthusiastically, praising what is good."
- SERVICE: "Help out when we can, working as a team by sharing and trusting each other."

Our Instrument of Government states:

Recognising its historic foundation, the school will preserve and develop its religious character in accordance with the principles of the Church of England and in partnership with the Church at parish and diocesan level. The school aims to serve its community by providing an education of the highest quality within the context of Christian belief and practice. It encourages an understanding of the meaning and significance of faith, and promotes Christian values through the experience it offers to all its pupils."

The historic "belief and practice" of the Church of England can be found in its Canons, with its teachings summarised in the Thirty-nine Articles of Religion, the Book of Common Prayer, and the Ordinal (Canon A5). The "Common Worship" series also aims to provide a wide variety of prayers and liturgical resources for use within a common framework and common structures.

Our revised Trust Deed (5th September 2014, clause 3.1) states:

Alongside St. Stephen's RC Primary, our school should "preserve and develop the respective religious character of each school in accordance with the principles and purposes of the respective Church."

The Equality Act 2010

It is against the law to discriminate against anyone because of: age; being or becoming a transsexual person; being married or in a civil partnership; being pregnant or having a child; disability; race including colour, nationality, ethnic or national origin; religion, belief or lack of religion/belief; sex; sexual orientation. These are protected characteristics. According to Schedule 11, exceptions exist for schools of a religious character that may include the content of the curriculum, collective worship and admissions.

Why do we view each other is such high regard, without discrimination?

"So God created man in his own image, in the image of God he created him; male and female he created them." *Genesis 1:27*

Why does community and meeting together matter?
